How many planets are in the Solar System?

The solar system has eight planets: Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus, and Neptune. There are five officially recognized dwarf planets in our solar system: Ceres, Pluto, Haumea, Makemake, and Eris. Why are the first 4 planets a terrestrial planet?

The order and arrangement of the planets and other bodies in our solar system is due to the way the solar system formed. Nearest to the Sun, only rocky material could withstand the heat when the solar system was young. For this reason, the first four planets - Mercury, Venus, Earth, and Mars - are terrestrial planets.

How did the Solar System form?

The mass at its centre collected to form the Sun and a flat disk of dust around it. This eventually formed the planets and other bodies of the solar system. The solar system consists of the Sun, planets, dwarf planets, moons, and numerous smaller objects such as comets and asteroids.

Which planets make up 99% of the Solar System?

Together the planets make up 0.14% of the solar systems mass, 99% of which is the gas giants (Jupiter, Saturn, Uranus and Neptune). The other reservoir, the Kuiper belt, is a thick disk-shaped zone whose main ...

The core is the hottest part of the Sun. Nuclear reactions here - where hydrogen is fused to form helium - power the Sun's heat and light. Temperatures top 27 million ...

The terrestrial planets are also sometimes referred to as the "rocky" planets. The surfaces of terrestrial planets have mountains, craters, canyons, and volcanoes. About 75% of Earth's surface is covered in water. Both Mars and Earth have permanent polar ice caps. None of the terrestrial planets in our solar system have ring systems.
